What Is ACTIVE Reading?

ACTIVE reading is an approach to reading, advocated by Neil J Anderson, that focuses on the following elements:

A = Activate Prior Knowledge

- · Activation of background knowledge improves reading comprehension.
- Getting Ready and Before You Read sections elicit learners' prior knowledge, and generate interest in the topic, through use of visual prompts and questions.

C = Cultivate Vocabulary

- · Vocabulary plays a crucial role in the development of reading ability.
- Vocabulary Comprehension sections in each unit examine vocabulary items encountered in the main reading passage.
- Vocabulary Skill sections provide learners with explicit skills-based instruction in how to learn, process, and decipher new vocabulary.

T = Think About Meaning

- In addition to testing for comprehension, the ACTIVE approach encourages learners to think deeply about the meaning of the text.
- . Check Your Understanding questions focus learners on the main ideas and key details of the text.
- Critical Thinking questions require learners to go beyond reading comprehension to analyze each text and the author's intent.

I = Increase Reading Fluency

- · Conscious development of reading rate and comprehension are key ingredients in building reading fluency.
- Tips for Fluent Reading (pages 8 and 9) encourage learners to become more aware of their own reading habits.
- Four Review Units reinforce learners' use of strategies and provide additional reading fluency practice.

V = Verify Strategies

- · Learners are encouraged to be aware of what they are doing and why they are doing it, as they read.
- Reading strategies are presented in the Reading Skill sections, the Vocabulary Skill sections, and the Real Life Skill section in each unit.
- Self Check sections in each Review Unit require learners to monitor the effectiveness of their own use
 of strategies.

E = Evaluate Progress

- · Both qualitative and quantitative evaluation of learners' progress is advocated.
- The Reading Rate Chart and the Reading Comprehension Chart allow learners to plot their achievements in building reading fluency.
- What Do You Think? sections provide opportunities for learners to show comprehension of the unit theme, through verbal or written discussion.

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Vocabulary Learning Tips

Learning new vocabulary is an important part of learning to be a good reader. Remember that the letter **C** in **ACTIVE Skills for Reading** reminds us to cultivate vocabulary.

1 Decide if the word is worth learning now

As you read you will find many words you do not know. You will slow your reading fluency if you stop at every new word. For example, you should stop to find out the meaning of a new word if:

- a. you read the same word many times.
- **b.** the word appears in the heading of a passage, or in the topic sentence of a paragraph—the sentence that gives the main idea of the paragraph.

2 Record information about new words you decide to learn

3 Learn words from the same family

For many important words in English that you will want to learn, the word is part of a word family. As you learn new words, learn words in the family from other parts of speech (nouns, verbs, adjectives, adverbs, etc.).



6 Memorize common prefixes, roots, and suffixes


Many English words can be divided into different parts. We call these parts *prefixes*, *roots*, and *suffixes*. A *prefix* comes at the beginning of a word, a *suffix* comes at the end of a word, and the *root* is the main part of the word. In your vocabulary notebook, make a list of prefixes and suffixes as you come across them. On page 175 there is a list of prefixes and suffixes in this book. For example, look at the word "unhappily."

7 Regularly review your vocabulary notebook

You should review the words in your vocabulary notebook very often. The more often you review your list of new words, the sooner you will be able to recognize the words when you see them during reading. Set up a schedule to go over the words you are learning.

8 Make vocabulary flash cards

Flash cards are easy to make, and you can carry them everywhere with you. You can use them to study while you are waiting for the bus, walking to school or work, or eating a meal. You can use the flash cards with your friends to guiz each other. Here is an example of a flash card:



Tips for Fluent Reading

Find time to read every day.

Find the best time of day for you to read. Try to read when you are not tired. By reading every day, even for a short period, you will become a more fluent reader.

Look for a good place to read.

It is easier to read and study if you are comfortable. Make sure that there is good lighting in your reading area and that you are sitting in a comfortable chair. To make it easier to concentrate, try to read in a place where you won't be interrupted.

Use clues in the text to make predictions.

Fluent readers make predictions before and as they read. Use the title, subtitle, pictures, and captions to ask yourself questions about what you are going to read. Find answers to the questions when you read. After reading, think about what you have learned and decide what you need to read next to continue learning.

Establish goals before you read.

Before you read a text, think about the purpose of your reading. For example, do you just want to get a general idea of the passage? Or do you need to find specific information? Thinking about what you want to get from the reading will help you decide what reading skills you need to use.

Notice how your eyes and head are moving.

Good readers use their eyes, and not their heads, when they read. Moving your head back and forth when reading will make you tired. Practice avoiding head movements by placing your elbows on the table and resting your head in your hands. Do you feel movement as you read? If you do, hold your head still as you read. Also, try not to move your eyes back over a text. You should reread part of a text only when you have a specific purpose for rereading, for example, to make a connection between what you read previously and what you are reading now.

Try not to translate.

Translation slows down your reading. Instead of translating new words into your first language, first try to guess the meaning. Use the context (the other words around the new word) and word parts (prefixes, suffixes, and word roots) to help you guess the meaning.



Read in phrases rather than word by word.

Don't point at each word while you read. Practice reading in phrases—groups of words that go together.

Engage your imagination.

Good readers visualize what they are reading. They create a movie in their head of the story they are reading. As you read, try sharing with a partner the kinds of pictures that you create in your mind.

Avoid subvocalization.

Subvocalization means quietly saying the words as you read. You might be whispering the words or just silently saying them in your mind. Your eyes and brain can read much faster than you can speak. If you subvocalize, you can only read as fast as you can say the words. As you read, place your finger on your lips or your throat. Do you feel movement? If so, you are subvocalizing. Practice reading without moving your lips.

Don't worry about understanding every word.

Sometimes, as readers, we think we must understand the meaning of everything that we read. It isn't always necessary to understand every word in a passage in order to understand the meaning of the passage as a whole. Instead of interrupting your reading to find the meaning of a new word, circle the word and come back to it after you have finished reading.

Enjoy your reading.

Your enjoyment of reading will develop over time. Perhaps today you do not like to read in English, but as you read more, you should see a change in your attitude. The more you read in English, the easier it will become. You will find yourself looking forward to reading.

Read as much as you can.

The best tip to follow to become a more fluent reader is to read whenever and wherever you can. Good readers read a lot. They read many different kinds of material: newspapers, magazines, textbooks, websites, and graded readers. To practice this, keep a reading journal. Every day, make a list of the kinds of things you read during the day and how long you read each for. If you want to become a more fluent reader, read more!

Everyone wants a job that pays well. Some people stop school early because they want to start earning cash right away. Others spend years and years studying in school in order to get a better job. Which is best? Actually, studies show that in most jobs, the higher your education, the higher your earning power.

- For example, in the United States, high school graduates can make about \$30,400 a year. The people who do not finish high school average only \$23,400 a year. Just having a document that says you finished high school means an extra \$7,000!

World Sports



Sports like soccer, baseball, and basketball are popular all over the world. Many countries also have their own national sports. These traditional games are often hundreds—or even thousands—of years old. Here is one example.

Sepak Takraw

- 5 Malaysia's national sport is sepak takraw (sepak means kick, and takraw means woven¹ ball). This fast-moving game is like both soccer and volleyball.
- In sepak takraw, players move the ball like they do in soccer and volleyball. Two teams (of three players each) compete by hitting a small ball across a net (like they do in volleyball). Players can use their heads, feet, shoulders, or knees to pass the ball to 15 the other team. But like in soccer games, players cannot use their hands.
- Playing sepak takraw is a little like playing 4 tennis, too. Like a tennis match, there are three sets² in a game. If one team drops the
 - 20 ball, the other team gets a **point**. The first team to get 15 points wins a set. The winner of two sets wins the whole game.
- The sport of sepak takraw is more than 1,000 years old. Originally, the native Malays played it. Later, the sport spread to other countries in Asia, including Thailand, Indonesia, and the 25 Philippines. Today, it is one of the most popular sports played in the Asian Games. There are also sepak takraw **clubs** in North America and Europe.

Don't say "no" to food. If the host of the meal offers you food or drink, take some and try a little.

Also remember: In many Moroccan homes, it is common to take off your shoes.

20 Tanzania

Tanzania is known for its fresh fish and spices. Don't act scared if your meal comes with its head still on the plate.

It is polite to try a bite of everything. In many Tanzanian homes, people sit at a table on small stools to eat.

25 It is OK to eat with your right hand, using bread or chapati² to pick up food. Everyone may take food from the same plate, but it is not usual for people to share drinks.

You may compliment the cook on a delicious meal, but don't exaggerate.3 In some parts of Tanzania, men and women will sit at different tables.



The tiny Middle Eastern nation of Qatar has a soccer team, but it has never played in soccer's greatest tournament, the World Cup.


5 However, something amazing will happen in 2022, when Qatar will become the first nation in the Middle East to host the men's Soccer World Cup games.

As a child, Alain Robert was afraid of heights. One day, when he was 12, he returned home from school. At the front door of his building, he looked for his keys. He didn't have them. It was 3:30, and his parents worked until 6:00 p.m. Robert looked at his apartment on the eighth floor. He saw an open window. He closed his eyes and 5 pictured himself climbing the building. When he opened his eyes, he told himself, "I can do it." Fifteen minutes later, he was in his house, and his fear of heights was gone.

Today, Robert (a native of France) still climbs buildings. In 2004, he climbed Taipei 101 (the tallest building in the world at the time), and in 2011 he climbed the Burj Khalifa tower in Dubai. To reach the top of a building, Robert usually uses only his hands and special shoes. To climb the Burj Khalifa tower, though, he was made to wear safety ropes.

Every day, 5,000 dabbawallahs deliver 200,000 lunches to people all over Mumbai. The dabbawallahs work together. They pick up a person's lunch from his or her house (or a

15 restaurant). They put the hot lunch in a special box (called a tiffin). Then they bring the lunch to the person's office or school by lunch time. The men travel long distances (many kilometers a day) on bicycle, train, and foot to deliver the lunchboxes on time.

20 Many of the deliverymen are poor. Most cannot read. They use a special system of colors and lines to write a person's name and address on a lunchbox.

There are many **challenges** (traffic, 3 bad weather, long distances), but the men are very organized. On average, for every 6 million lunches they deliver, they make fewer than one mistake! The dabbawallahs do so well that some teach classes at business schools



First album in English: Laundry Service


By creating their clothes from recycled materials, the designers are helping to keep Austin clean. They are also showing people that recycling can be a creative activity.







The World's Most Mysterious Manuscript¹

In 1912, book dealer Wilfrid Voynich bought a number of books in Italy. He bought so many that he didn't look very closely at the books he was purchasing. When he got home, he

5 discovered he had bought a very strange handwritten manuscript. It was written in a language he had never seen before. It was also full of pictures of plants.


Since then, the book—now known as the 10 Voynich Manuscript—has become known as the world's most **mysterious** manuscript. It has been studied by many people, including professors, codebreakers, and language experts. However, no one has ever discovered 15 its meaning or author.

There are many ideas about who wrote it and why. Some people say that a famous scientist like Francis Bacon wrote it. Other people think it could be a religious text.² Some other people think the 20 manuscript is a great hoax and doesn't mean

anything at all. Scientists have learned that the manuscript was made between 1404 and 1438. However, this

only tells us how old the paper is, not when the 25 book was written. But there's still hope that the manuscript is real and that there's meaning to its words.

The Voynich Manuscript remains a mystery today, but the pages are on the Internet if you would like 30 to try to crack the code.

Alive to Tell Their Tale!1

- On August 5, 2010, an accident trapped 0 33 men 700 meters underground. The men worked for a copper and gold mine near Copiapó, Chile. At first, no one knew if the 5 miners had lived through the accident.
- Then, on the morning of August 22, rescue 2 workers made a hole deep enough to reach the miners. The men wrote notes and sent them up. The miners had survived by eating only
 - 10 small bits of food at a time and drinking a little milk once a day. (The mine kept some food and drinks underground in case of an emergency.) They had used their tools to dig for water. They had used the batteries from machines to keep some lights on.



Once the miners were found, the rescue workers passed them food, water, books, and letters from their families. Even though the miners had been found, the rescuers had to work hard to get them out. The rescuers needed a powerful drill to dia deep into the ground. It took 52 more days to save the men.

On the night of October 12, the

workers were able to save the men. One by one the miners were brought up in a specially built elevator. They were weak, so the workers were very careful. Family members, 25 friends, and people around the world cheered and celebrated. Church bells rang throughout Chile.

In all, the miners spent 69 terrifying days underground. 6 "We had strength, . . . we wanted to fight for our families, and that was the greatest thing." said Luis Urzua, the 30 supervisor.² He was the last miner to be saved.



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
